

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ON THE COVER

A crucial river crossing

The scenic countryside, with its clean air and lush vineyards in the approach to Worcester, remains a sight to behold for local and foreign visitors. However, before 1897, transportation and travel from the Cape to Worcester posed a serious challenge owing to impassable mountains and rivers. Produce had to be transported to the markets in the Cape, involving significant delays and hassle either across Bain's Kloof Pass or via Villiersdorp. Heavier cargo had to be initially sent via rail from Cape Town and then back to Worcester.

In June 1889, a Select Committee on the Breede River Bridge was established to discuss and urge the British colonial government to construct a proper bridge across the Breede River, thereby linking Villiersdorp and Caledon to Worcester.

In a report from the Divisional Council of Worcester in 1893, Mr De Vos proposed the desirability of a bridge that 'would not only connect the district of Caledon with Worcester and the railway by the shortest possible route, taken in a natural direction ... exactly calculated to secure the continued use of the proclaimed hard road'.

The construction of the bridge commenced on 25 March 1895 at a cost of £19,000, which, by the standards of the day, was enormous. Workers, under the supervision of Mr Chadwick, toiled painstakingly. A staggering 70,000 pounds of timber was conveyed to the Worcester station and from there to the building site at Nieuwe Drift. Upon its completion in December 1896, the meticulously built wooden bridge was considered one of the finest and longest bridges in South Africa. Esq. JWH Meiring expressed his gratitude, stating that the bridge 'will stand for long and many a day, and if it contributes to the prosperity of Worcester... then Worcester will derive immense benefit from it'.

The Breede River Bridge at Worcester was to become a vital infrastructural asset as it greatly reduced travel time to Cape Town. In 1956, the wooden bridge was replaced by a concrete, more durable bridge. In Worcester, some original wooden panels were placed on the central square as testimony to the building efforts. Together with the Du Toits Kloof Pass, the bridge today continues to serve as a crucial road transport artery for Worcester and its people.

The **Cape Librarian** extends its gratitude to the Western Cape Archives and Records Service (WCARS) for making available its rare collection of vintage photographs for the cover images of the magazine in 2024.

All of these megacorporations' innovators read science fiction as kids.

Fiction, then, isn't just about fairies and space thrusters. It's about the revelation of what's possible; that plants the seeds of disaffection that powers the reader to want to do more and be better.

And remember: everything that's man-made — be it from the paper you are reading this column on to a computer screen in your bricks-and-mortar home in a suburban house — was only imagined at some point.

That's the power of reading.

We live in a time where information is no longer a scarce commodity. It is written somewhere that, thanks to the internet, today more information is generated every two days than everything created from the birth of humanity until 2003-combined.

Clearly, if not all the answers, then many — of the warning signs of the chaos we find the world in today — were written down a long time ago. Might the world have been a better place if someone had bothered to read them?

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Elsies River sows the seeds of dreams

Elsies River Library, in collaboration with Cape Careers Exhibitors Association, hosted a career expo at the town's civic centre at the end of January.

We invited neighbouring schools and were able to accommodate more than 500 students, whose attendance was divided into two sessions. Eighteen institutions took part in the expo and included, amongst others, AFDA, CPUT, Future Flyers, HFPA, IMM Graduate School, I Student Academy, Mancosa, Northlink College, Open Window, Richfield, AAA STADIO, Stellenbosch University, The Paragon Generation, Unisa and Western Cape College of Nursing.

The library also had its own information desk where we handed out information about the library, membership forms, library bags, and marketing material.









As was priorly arranged, each school visited during different time slots. As part of the introduction, we explained the role of the library and the assistance available to students during the application phase at the institutions of their choice.

Learners were then directed to the booths representing the various institutions to ask questions and gather information on their career choices.

Elsies River Library provides a safe space for studying and doing research. The feedback from our schools and institutions indicated that the expo was a great success. We plan to host another expo in September with the long-term goal of making this an annual event.

Two Service Excellence Awards for DCAS

On Friday, 19 April, two teams from the Department of Cultural Affairs and Sport (DCAS) were awarded for their hard work at the Western Cape Government's Service Excellence Awards, hosted by the Department of the Premier. The Service Excellence Awards are held every year to highlight the exceptional work being done by teams and individuals across all the WCG departments.

The Library Service team was nominated and won silver in the category of Best Support Services Team. In November 2022, the SLIMS system, managing Western Cape Library Service and its 375 libraries, crashed, with SITA struggling to restore it. Partial recovery in February 2023 resulted in data loss from June 4 to November 15, 2022, impacting 6 million items worth R478 million. A dedicated recovery team worked tirelessly, recovering over 10 million records alongside regular duties, ensuring service continuity and upholding Batho Pele principles and Western Cape Core Values.

The Departmental Information Management team won bronze in the category of Best Support Services Team.

Library Week: marching for social cohesion

How does a department such as the City of Cape Town's Library and Information Services, interpret the South African Library Week (SALW) 2024 theme, *Libraries Foster Social Cohesion*? By marching through the CBD with as many of its key partners as possible and ensuring that every single event during the week has key partners and broad community participation.

And that is exactly what happened on 15 March (and the rest of the week). The list of partners was extensive but none were more important than the LIS staff who came out to walk the 5 km-long route while singing, dancing, waving posters, wearing costumes — all with a whole lot of exuberance.

Joining the road marchers were the City's Mayoral Committee Member for Community Service and Health, Councillor Patricia van der Ross, and the Portfolio Committee Chairperson, Councillor Ronel Viljoen.

The walk seemed over way too quickly and stakeholders lingered long after the march at the end point, drinking some much-needed water while still soaking up the atmosphere.

Then the actual week happened, and as per usual for City Libraries, it coincided with Fine-Free Week, where patrons were given the opportunity to return outstanding material without paying a fine. It's the ideal chance to return material and indulge in something new to read, watch or listen to.

18 March marked the start of the SALW. Area East hosted an integrated programme with a poetry competition held at Melton Rose Library. Participants from Sir Lowry Pass Primary, De Kuilen High School, Khanyolwethu, Eerste River, and Sarepta High Schools were in attendance. Judging by the reaction of the audience, the poetry submissions were excellent. Learners were well-prepared and judged for content and delivery.

Area Central hosted a jam-packed programme with ECDs for pregnant and new mommies. Learners from Our Lady of the Rosary, Ikhlaas and Masjidur Rahman Educare were entertained by the Ward 47 Safety Ambassadors, Mayoral Urban Regeneration Programme (MURP), the Bridgetown

Theatre Company, Aunty T and LiBee, as well as the City's Recreation and Parks department. Stakeholders in attendance also included City Health's Hanover Park Clinic and the Edith Stephens Nature Reserve.

Area South's programme was also geared for the ECDs. The event took place at Lentegeur Civic Centre and the little ones were educated about littering and the importance of washing hands. The audience was also treated to fun storytelling sessions, and interactive exhibitions sharing the importance of caring for children.

Area North held a highly engaging event at Dunoon Library for the ECDs, concluding the week on a high note. Recreation and Parks took the young ones outside for a fun interactive start to the programme, and Traffic Services took the little ones on a journey on road safety and how to navigate roads as pedestrians. The Sports Development NGO and the Safe Foundation, who work to empower children living in townships, entertained the children with songs and stories.

Fine-Free Week results

The period turned out as one of the most successful Fine-Free Weeks, with more than half of the outstanding items safely being returned. At the start of the amnesty period there were 35,411 items outstanding, valued at R3,9 million. By the end of the week, 18,583 items had been returned (worth approximately R2,2 million), accounting for roughly 52% of the outstanding items. 20,275 fines were waived during the period.

This result constitutes a massive increase in comparison to Fine-Free Week in 2023; when only 19% of the more than 39,000 outstanding items made their way back.

Incidentally, titles from *The diary of a wimpy kid-*series by Jeff Kinney topped the list of outstanding items, as has been the case for several years. The top six items returned during the most recent amnesty period were all part of the series.

Skrywer, kenner van jeugliteratuur sterf in motorongeluk



"n Reuseverlies vir die Afrikaanse boekewêreld."

Dit is hoe vriende gereageer het op die skoknuus dat die skrywer en afgetrede professor Maritha Snyman in 'n motorongeluk oorlede is.

Snyman (71), bekend vir topverkoperkinderboeke soos die *Lekker lawwe lagboek*reeks, 'n Annerste ABC-

boek vir aspatatte en verskeie titels in die *Reënboogrant maat*-reeks, het na Lephalale in Limpopo gery toe sy betrokke was in 'n motorongeluk met twee ander voertuie.

'Dit is 'n reuseskok,' sê Linette van der Merwe, 'n jarelange vriendin van Snyman. Volgens Van der Merwe was Snyman die toonbeeld van elegante grasie sonder om ooit aanstellerig te wees. 'Sy was die beliggaming van ruimhartigheid in elke sin van die woord,' sê Van der Merwe.

Fanie Viljoen, jeugboekskrywer, sê Snyman se afsterwe laat 'n groot leemte in die kinderboek-genre. 'Ek ken Maritha van die ATKV-skryfskole af waar ons saam praatjies aangebied het... Maritha was nie net 'n uitstekende skrywer nie, maar sy het ook 'n uitsonderlike kennis van kinder- en jeugliteratuur gehad. Een van die vernaamste studies oor Afrikaanse kinders se leesgewoontes is deur haar gedoen,' sê Viljoen.

Nandi Lessing-Venter, uitgewer en hoof van die kinderen-jeugboek-afdeling van Penguin Random House in Suid-Afrika, sê: 'Maritha sal met deernis onthou word ná haar skielike dood... Haar dood is 'n groot verlies vir die Suid-Afrikaanse literêre gemeenskap, maar haar nalatenskap leef voort deur haar stories vir jong lesers,' sê Lessing-Venter.

Biblioteekdiens groet voormalige direkteur

'Frans van der Merwe was 'n deeglike mens.' Só sê Ds Reinder Kingma tydens dié voormalige direkteur van die Biblioteekdiens se roudiens op Donderdag, 16 Mei.

En dit was inderdaad so. Frans (82) was die derde direkteur van die Kaapse Provinsiale Biblioteekdiens (later Wes-Kaapse Biblioteekdiens); 'n amp wat hy met onderskeiding van 1985 tot 1997 beklee het.

Hy het 1966 by die Biblioteekdiens begin werk en sy eerste pos was dié van streekbibliotekaris van die Kimberleystreek. Daarna word hy hoofbibliotekaris van die Noord-Kaap en in 1979 verhuis hy na Kaapstad as 'n assistentdirekteur van die Biblioteekdiens. In 1985 word hy tot direkteur bevorder.

Sy tour de force tydens sy jare in Kimberley was die oorskryf en hersien van die Handboek vir Streekbibliotekarisse. Dié omvattende gids van meer as 300 bladsye was vir amper 30 jaar 'n bybel vir die personeel van die streekorganisasie van die Biblioteekdiens.

As 'n nuwe besem het hy destyds nie gras onder sy voete laat groei nie. Die Biblioteekdiens het geweldig begin groei in die sewentigs en tagtigs en het Frans dienooreenkomstig gesorg dat die boekbegroting daarmee saam verhoog is. In 1985 was die aantal nuwe boeke 284,000 en in 1988 het hierdie syfer meer as verdubbel tot 691,000.

Hy het ook 'n werkstudie onderneem waarna die bestuursorganogram aangepas en meer senior poste geskep is om die Diens meer doeltreffend te maak.

Frans het die bemarking van biblioteekdienste as belangrik beskou en tydens sy jare aan die stuur is daar op groot skaal projekte aangepak, waarvan die jaarlikse Biblioteekweek 'n hoogtepunt was. Onder meer is t-hemde, ballonne, plakkate, boekmerke, plakkers en vrolike plastiese drasakke vir boeke uitgedeel. Nog 'n hoogtepunt was die konferensies waarna hy internasionale sprekers genooi het, soos die een in 1990 tydens Unesco se Jaar van die Leser.

Frans was progressief en met die verskyning van die Zaaiman-verslag in 1998 het hy werkswinkels gereël om dienste uit te brei na die provinsie se benadeelde swart gemeenskappe. 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'The Queen of Adderley Street': records of the Cape's oldest bank by Gustav Hendrich

or a century and a half, the Standard Bank building in the centre of Cape Town has not only been a majestic architectural gem to passersby, but also represented the bank's financial resilience. In reflecting on its historical value, it proves conducive to shed light on this venerable banking facility. As for its stature, the historiographer Dr George McCall Theal mentioned that 'in 1883 it was a very prominent building, and was the largest and finest structure used for banking in South Africa... only to be dwarfed by the surrounding General Post Office and Cartwright's Mansion House'.1

Ideally situated in the main thoroughfare of Adderley Street, neighbouring the flower market next and Greenmarket Square in the adjacent block, the building has become an integral, almost inseparable part of the city. In later years, John R Shorten of the City of Cape Town pointed to the striking appearance of the 'figure of Britannia raising her trident above the porticoed building... which has symbolised the security and financial strength of an institution, (and) which has been part of the history of the City and of the whole of South Africa'.² After its closure in 2015 the contested status of ownership of the building hung in the balance for almost a decade; facing the possibility of conversion to a city museum or governmental offices. It was auctioned off in October 2021 and still holds the title of South Africa's oldest bank.³

Against the backdrop of its striking architecture and long-lasting banking legacy, the Western Cape Archives and Records Service in Roeland Street in Cape Town is in possession of primary sources and photographic imagery that attested to the longstanding presence of the bank in serving both state and civil society.

Meagre banking beginnings

It is safe to argue that the earliest banking practices during the settlement of the Dutch East India Company in 1652 were for the most part rudimentary. With the intention of the Cape to merely serve as a refreshment station, little attention was given to the advancement of a fully-fledged bank. Only as late as 1793, when the Company's rule was collapsing owing to bankruptcy, a loan bank was set up by the Dutch commissioners Nederburgh and Frykenius. With the dismal economic situation bookending the Company dynasty, the bank's existence proved short-lived. It was only after the Second British occupation of the Cape in 1806, that the foundations were laid for the establishment of banking institutions, local private banks and insurance companies cast in the British mold of banking — in its colonial territories.

Within the realm of British colonial expansion, its banking expertise at the Cape was still on an elementary level and would only develop rapidly during the mid-19th century. Between 1836 and 1861, almost 30 banks were opened in the Cape Colony.4 The driving force behind the early banking development could be ascribed to the enterprising pioneer, John Paterson, who played an instrumental role in the establishment of companies in the Cape Colony. One such institution was to be the first Standard Bank in Gqeberha (formerly Port Elizabeth). The bank prospered so remarkably that arrangements were made for a more geographically centralised location in Cape Town, for it became the hub of trade, market and strategic importance to the British Empire on the seaways between East and West.

An imposing neo-classical building


At first, the Standard Bank in Cape Town was accommodated in the pastry cook's house named Cairncross, opening its doors to the public on 4 January 1864. With Paterson being admired as the founding father of the first two European banks in South Africa, namely the Standard Bank of British South Africa (the term 'British' was later omitted) and the London and South African Bank, the former became such a premier establishment that it succeeded in attracting the account of the Cape Colonial Government.⁵ Whilst Paterson was also an ardent politician in the Cape Parliament, the actual success of the 'Standard', as its name was locally abbreviated, could be ascribed to its first General Manager Robert Stewart.

The skilled Stewart, who at the time became a household name, was able to lead the bank through often tough financial times, severe depression and a decline in share value. Despite the lack of early regulatory legislation for banking at the Cape, the Standard Bank under Paterson and Stewart nonetheless strove to introduce a new system of banking; one which was based on large capital and first-class independent management.⁶

From inception the Standard proved it could weather the storm of financial calamities as it settled itself firmly in the South African framework. By comparison, several local banks quickly collapsed as a result of weak administration, improper bookkeeping or inexperience. By the 1870's the Standard had taken over many local banks — as well as its principal

competitor, the London and South African Bank in 1877 — with the result that its banking practices had virtually outgrown their accommodation. The Standard's prestige made it the foremost bank in both the governments of the Cape Colony and the South African Republic (the former Transvaal). Essentially, it contributed to laying the cornerstone of the unification of South Africa financially. According to the author G Amphlett, the Standard managed to hold more than half of the Coin in the country with its capital being fully employed, and coupled with this - was appointed in 1873 as the sole banker of the Cape Colonial Government.7

However, since the Standard's building at Cairncross was still being rented since 1864, complaints of the confectioner's store forming part of the bank and the lack of ventilation — the bank's functionality became so strained that a new location was sought. Thus, in 1879 the City Council offered a site on a prime business area for a 99-year lease at £150 per annum. The bank management agreed upon the offer and summoned a most renowned architect, Charles Freeman, who became acclaimed for his drawings of the Houses of Parliament, to draw up the plans for the new Standard Bank building. Its builder, Thomas Ingleby, tendered for its construction for £27.000.8

Work started in earnest and after nearly two years of toil, the building was officially opened on 19 March 1883. Inevitably, the headquarters of the Standard Bank in South Africa would subsequently relocate from Gqeberha to Cape Town. Built in the neo-classicist architecture of the late-Victorian era with its silver-painted embroidered fences and hoarding on the building, the structure epitomised British imperialism in Southern Africa. The interior was similarly impressive. It contained a grandiose banking hall, classic checkerboard floor, wooden counters and various departments such as branch audit, inspection, correspondence and strongrooms for records.

Yet, apart from its picturesque appearance, Amphlett mentioned there was the occasional criticism from the public, that besides 'the handsome and commodious character of the new premises attracting general attention... some of the despondent characters were disposed to criticise the proportions of the building as unnecessarily pretentious and extravagant'. During the bank's opening, the mayor, however, remarked about its prosperity and unifying role by stating that it was indeed the 'national bank of South Africa'. 10

Memorandum of the Standard Bank

Because the Standard Bank was established in England in 1862, an official Memorandum and Articles of Association was published and circulated to all banking branches in Southern Africa. Bankers had to adhere to the regulations, instructions and terminologies of the banking services. The first memorandum, signed by Robert Stewart in 1866, stipulated that where 'British supremacy has been proclaimed... every kind of banking business, the receiving of deposits of money, either in the United Kingdom or elsewhere' shall be enacted. It stated that the nominal capital of the company stood at £1,000,000, divided into 10,000 shares of £100 each, to be increased if needed to an amount not exceeding £2,000,000.11

The banking structure would consist of directors and bankers with clear-cut directions on the dealings and practices on shares, capital and other miscellaneous banking matters. According to the pivotal archival group, the Limited Companies (LC), the

records on the bank's proprietors and shareholders reflect their full names in alphabetical order; as well as containing subsequently revised editions of the Memorandum. From his Standard Bank branch in Port Elizabeth, Lewis Michell, the joint general manager, corresponded with the Cape Colonial Secretary and provided a handwritten list of shareholders.

By 1881 the enormity of the Standard Bank became apparent, with its value increasing to a staggering £4,000,000, divided into 40,000 shares. To ensure proper functioning, bankers could resort to the Memorandum for guidance, after which they could liaise with the head banking authorities in London for unforeseeable uncertainties. The Memorandum remained unchanged throughout, creating uniformity in their everyday dealings and provided stability to the bank.

Through the boom and war years

The discovery of diamonds, gold and minerals in the interior, together with the enormous innovations brought about by the Industrial Revolution, created a greater drive towards the attainment of wealth and its financial management — of which banking served as the pillars. The Diamond Rush to Kimberley and the major share booms following from mining on the Witwatersrand in 1886, led to incalculable prosperity being generated.

Conversely, it also created grossly inflated market prices. By 1890 the unregulated stock market collapsed so catastrophically that even two presumably infallible banks, the Union Bank and the Cape of Good Hope Bank, had to close their doors. To save other banks from similar fates, the Cape Banking Act of 1891 was implemented, though merely seemed to further strengthen the already affluent, established banks at the Cape.¹³ The Standard Bank offered immediate assistance and eventually

had to amalgamate the liquidated banks, thereby further consolidating its increasingly dominant role. The bank attracted famed personalities such as the British magnate Cecil John Rhodes, who became a valued client.

With the advent of the South African War of 1899 to 1902 and the failure of the Jameson Raid in 1896 in Johannesburg, there was an influx of people and foreigners to the Cape. Despite war clouds gathering, this brought additional clientele for the Standard Bank headquarters in Cape Town; and the Standard Bank stood steadfast to continue rendering sound banking services. However, as a result of the tens of thousands of British and colonial forces, refugees and reinforcements docking at the Cape ports, the Standard in Adderley Street was facing tremendous administrative pressure.14 It was reported that soldiers, militiamen and magnates from the interior conducted so many transactions between Cape Town and Johannesburg that the bank was necessitated to function day and night.

After the war in 1902, the Standard Bank remained an influential institution. Despite the reluctance to exchange Transvaal Mint Coins and the inconvenience of their handling, the Standard eventually complied with governmental regulations.¹⁵ According to records in the Government House archival group, the distribution of British Silver Coin in the territories of South Africa with the promotion of inland transactions was agreed upon, yet disillusionment over the Kruger Coins from the Transvaal persisted in banking quarters. As a result of the inconvenience and expense of transacting Minted Coins from the Transvaal, described as 'an irritation to those who tender such coins in Colonies where it is not legal tender', bank authorities pushed the government for the withdrawal of Transvaal coinage.16

However, ongoing negotiations to continue its circulation were to be ascertained by the Cape Parliament. The Standard Bank accepted the proposal to continue circulating, and by 1910

with the unification of South Africa, the trading in British silver and gold coinage was to be implemented throughout the Union. Thus, it attested to the effective voice of the Standard Bank on important politico-economic decisions.

Legacy of a bank

Despite the financial difficulties during the years of the Great Depression from 1929 to 1933 and the two world wars, the Standard Bank remained a renowned institution. With Cape Town evolving into a cosmopolitan city though, the bank's practical facilities became ever more limited by a lack of space, especially at its headquarters in Adderley Street. Its management was compelled to increase the building's capacity by adding two floors. A most outstanding addition was the bank's purchasing of a freehold situated at the corner of Adderley and Darling Streets in 1958 from the Municipality of Cape Town for the equivalent of R2 million.¹⁷

Apart from its ideal location in the central business district, bank patrons were often inconvenienced by noise from vehicles or crowds gathering and irregularities close to its entrance. In 1961 the bank made objections to the City Council on the grounds of the Red Cross Society's intention to hold

a street market outside its premises, but because of traffic congestion, the consequent ruling was made that no street markets be allowed which could lead to the detriment and disturbance of the bank.¹⁸

Throughout the ensuing years building additions, including alterations in 1920, were made which are depicted in a foldout plan housed at the WCARS repository. Administrative-related matters are predominantly contained in the archives of the Provincial Administration, Local Authorities (PAA), the Municipality of Cape Town (3/CT) and various archival groups.

Although no single archival group is available on the Standard Bank in Adderley Street specifically, records are for the most part dispersed in the various abovementioned archival groups with its references to be traced on the National Archives of South Africa (NAAIRS) database. The letters of Sir Lewis L Michell, the general manager in 1883, are contained in the Lewis Michell Collection in the Accessions, who was hailed for 'his sound knowledge of finance (that) gave the Standard Bank an outstanding reputation.'20 These paperbased records are of irreplaceable value for information on the existence of the bank. Above all, records on banking are accessible for research

purposes to future generations of scholars. Also noteworthy is the availability of unique photographic depictions of the Standard Bank building mainly housed in the AG, Jeffrey's and Elliott's collections.

Citizens and tourists alike are still amazed in contemporary Cape Town by the architectural beauty of the building nicknamed the 'Queen of Adderley Street'. Although its practical status as headquarters of the Standard Bank shifted in 1953 to Pretoria, and its functionality dwindled to a mere 100 staff members by 2015 with the building being auctioned and indefinitely closed to the public, the building nonetheless adds to the nostalgia of the Adderley Street scenery. As for banking, following in the footsteps of its grandiose headquarters the Standard Bank was to expand to 43 branches across the Cape.

John R Shorten acknowledged the bank's legacy in his conclusive remarks that '…it is with a sense of pride and achievement that… the development of the city has been paralleled by the growth of the local business of Standard Bank'.²¹

How does typing affect the way we process what we write, and what are the consequences of giving up handwriting at school age?

t the beginning of 1882, the philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche received a machine called the 'Malling-Hansen Writing Ball', a nifty little gadget covered with keys. The thinker's eyesight had been getting worse, to the point where he could no longer write by hand. In March of the same year, he was able to continue writing thanks to this new instrument.


His friend, the composer Heinrich Köselitz, noted a certain stylistic change in his texts from that time onwards, as his prose became more terse and succinct. It appears that the content of some of his philosophy was also affected.

Embodied cognition

This change — a reminder that 'the medium is the message' — might be explained by new theories of embodied cognition. Modern cognitive science indicates that motor and sensory aspects of our behaviour have consequences that reach further than we may, at first, suspect.

Our minds are not filled with disembodied ideas. We need to take our bodies and senses into account to explain phenomena that are otherwise inexplicable.

In a study carried out almost two decades ago, subjects were presented with words carrying a positive connotation (such as 'sweet') or negative (such as 'rubbish'). Subjects had to indicate whether a word was 'good' or 'bad' by moving a joystick. Half of the subjects were told to indicate that a word was 'good' by pulling the joystick towards their bodies, and the other half were told to indicate 'good' by pushing it away.

To indicate that a word was 'bad', the subjects made the opposite movement to 'good'. A consistent correlation was observed between meaning and movement: the quickest responses were produced by the subjects who were told to indicate 'good' by pulling the joystick towards themselves and to indicate 'bad' by pushing it away.

This direct involvement of the body and senses in mental processes can explain how writing by hand (as opposed to other types of writing) helps us to learn letters and words. This is backed up by the results of various studies, which we will now present.

Memory ability


As an example, a 2021 study compared short and mid-term recall of words learned either by typing or writing by hand. Recall was better when words had been learned with a pencil and paper.

In another study, a small group of adults learned new symbols (from a language of Asian origin) that they then had to reproduce with a pencil or a keyboard. When they had finished learning the symbols, there were no differences in recall between the two methods, but the keyboard users forgot a significant amount of what they had learned as time passed by.

Some experts suggest that learning by pen and paper is better because it is more 'embodied'. This means that it involves a set of more complex sensory-motor processes particular to each letter. This complexity leaves a more distinctive footprint in our memories and, as a result, makes things easier to memorise and recall, much like how a two-metre-tall supermodel might be more memorable than someone with average features.

Mental resources

Another benefit to writing by hand is that it puts less strain on our brains. Typing puts more demand on our mental resources, causing difficulties when it comes to word memorisation tasks. The increased mental load is due to the greater speed at which words are typed. This, in turn, means there are more individual elements to process over a certain period.





The idea of complexity appears in other studies to explain similar differences when writing in a second language. Other authors have also suggested that more mental resources are used because writing is more complex when performed on the keyboard.

Planning and composition

The way we write can also affect higher levels of word processing in our brains. It is thought that the type of writing sets the pace of cognitive processing — if the writing process is slow and cumbersome it can interfere with the higher processes on which it depends, causing ideas and relevant information to be forgotten.

In several experiments, an improvement has been noted in overall written composition (quality, length and fluidity of text) after subjects completed handwriting exercises. In the same vein, a study has shown that students plan their texts more carefully when using pen and paper than they do when using a keyboard.

Longer and better quality texts

Nevertheless, it must be recognised that keyboards have also brought us many advantages. For example, some meta-analyses comparing handwritten texts with those written on a computer found the latter to often be longer and better composed.

In addition, people with literacy problems are those who feel these benefits most acutely. However, some of these studies lack experimental rigour, which raises doubts about their clarity and general usefulness.

A disembodied mind

The Matrix film tetralogy presents the idea of a mind without a body. But a disembodied mind that exists only in the virtual world is much like Plato's cave. The torches that cast shadows on the wall are replaced by computer simulations. In real life, however, the mind performs its operations alongside the functioning of our entire body.

We are closer to a purely symbolic, disembodied mind when we type on the keyboard (a device that works with minimal sensory involvement) than when we put pen to paper, as our cognitive system reacts differently depending on the motor and sensory inputs that we experience.

Implications for education

The results of these studies all indicate that eliminating handwriting from school — as has reportedly been done in Finland — is not a good idea. This does not mean that we should stop using keyboards, not even in infancy. However, we must be on the lookout for future studies on this topic, and act on their repercussions in the education sector as promptly as possible.





Establishment dates of public libraries in the Western Cape

Genadendal Public Library turns 200

by the Research Section



he historic village of Genadendal, situated in the Overberg between Caledon and Greyton, was established by George Schmidt in 1737 and is the oldest mission station in the country. Today it boasts the oldest public library in the Western Cape and second oldest public library in South Africa.

The South African Public Library, today known as the National Library of South Africa, situated in central Cape Town, was the first library to be established in South Africa. It was officialised by a government proclamation on 20 March 1818. The year 1822 also saw the establishment

of a public library — presumably a subscription library — in Graaff-Reinet. As the National Library of South Africa is no longer a public library, Graaff-Reinet Public Library became the oldest public library in South Africa; and the one at Genadendal the second oldest. It turns 200 years old in 2024.

In planning for the then-future library, the missionary Hans Hallbeck wrote: 'I am contriving to fit a room for a library, which I consider a necessary appendage to our school and church here at Genadendal. I know it would be a gratification to many a traveller and make no doubt but what we should obtain contributions in books, et cetera,

towards it. If you therefore, or any of your friends, could spare us any old or new books fit for our library, I should feel much obliged to you.'

Many responded and hundreds of books were sent from Holland, England and Germany. As a result, the *Genadendallers* became keen library users — as the report from Periodical Accounts (1838) stated: 'Our library is in a brisk circulation, so that we have not one volume on hand, for as soon as one is brought in, it is immediately issued to fresh applicants.'

Dated back to 1824, the first library books and archival material of the church were packed in cupboards and housed in the Blougrotte building, before they were moved to the Middle House, where the first book collection was held in a room that served as a library.

It was only in 1964 that a provincial public library under the CPA (Cape Provincial Administration) was established in the old wheat barn behind the water mill in Genadendal.

A new building was constructed in 1992 and is currently the public library in Genadendal, residing under the Theewaterskloof Municipality.

anneer 'n mens ledig is en onseker is waarvoor jy volgende lus is, is avontuur net die regte doepa.

Jong aksieliefhebbertjies wat kookwater-storielyne geniet en uitsien na daardie asemophou-oomblik, word saam met die karakters weggevoer — net om weer asem te skep wanneer die ontknoping die held uiteindelik tot rus laat kom na 'n verhaal se klimaks.

(Dis nou as jy nie self 'n plan hoef te maak om die wrede draak te oorwin nie.)

Behalwe as daar 'n opvolgboek is — want dan begin die aksie wéér van voor af. Soms maak die leser saam 'n epiese reis met die hoofkarakter mee, of 'n sending waar allerlei magiese karakters ontmoet en gevare getrotseer word.

As 'n ouer, versorger of onderwyser dié stories kan voorlees, is dit 'n bonus. Kom reis saam deur die skatkis van jong Afrikaanse avontuurverhale en herontdek die vreugde van verbeeldingsvlugte.

Suidooster-draak (LAPA, 2021) deur Dianne Hofmeyr is 'n inspirerende Afrikaanse vertaling van die Engelse titel, Storm Dragon deur Nandi Lessing-Venter. Dit handel oor 'n oupa, sy kleinkind en hul hond. Terwyl die wilde Kaapse Suidooster ruk oor die turkooisblou see, trotseer oupa en kleinkind die strand. Gewapen met 'n teleskoop en skild maak hulle allerlei avontuurlike ontdekkings — soos die draak se juwele, sy spore, 'n babadrakie en 'n seerowerskip.

Dis 'n storie wat aanklank sal vind by jong lesertjies, want die ryk beeldskepping word verder versterk deur die swiepende bewegings in die besonderse illustrasies deur Carol Thompson. Plofwoorde soos 'Doef! Daf! Wip! Spring!' verleen trefkrag aan onverwagse oomblikke in die verhaal. As prenteboek is dit 'n viering van speel en verbeelding wat maklik by jong lesers sal aanklank vind.


Nog 'n prenteboek en versamelbundel met treffende kleur-illustrasies is Goue lint stories: Die mooiste avontuurverhale (Human & Rousseau, 2020) oorvertel deur Stefania Leonardi Hartley en vertaal deur Kobus Geldenhuys. Die sponsgevoerde buiteblad is 'n uitnodiging vir klein handjies om die boek te ontdek. Jong lesers tussen ses en nege jaar word bekendgestel aan verskeie klassieke avontuurverhale soos Om die wêreld in 80 dae, Robinson Crusoe, Lancelot se avonture. Gulliver en die Lulliputers. White Fang, Die drie musketiers, Tarzan, Skateiland, Reis na die middel van die aarde, Tom Sawyer en Huckleberry Finn en Sandokan, die tier van Maleisië.

Die verhale is prettig en geskik vir voorlees, aangesien die stories verkort is en op 'n eenvoudige wyse aangebied word om kinders op fantastiese ontdekkingsreise te neem wat avontuurlustigheid sal aanwakker. Dit is veral geskik as leesboek vir beginners.

In die reeks Die ware avonture van Adelie en Riley vertel Felicia Snyman-Du Toit verhale oor 'n dogtertjie en haar hond. In Boek Een, **Die** swembadmonster (LAPA, 2023), baljaar Adelie en haar geliefde Bostonterrier, Riley, in die swembad. In 'n droomoomblik word hulle verplaas na Pegasus, die Eiland van die Eenhorings waar 'n monster met slymerige tentakels haar (opblaasbare) Eenhoring verwurg. Adelie neem wraak. Sy en Riley gaan in die nag terug om die monster te verslaan. Die volgende oggend sien haar pa daar is iets vreemds aan die gang by die swembad! 'n Verbeeldingryke storie met fantasie- en verrrassende elemente.

In Boek Twee, **Die Amadidas** (LAPA, 2023), speel Adelie en Riley op die klimraam in die agterplaas wanneer hulle na 'n denkbeeldige Amasone verplaas word. In die bosse en bome van die woud is groot, vyandige voëls. Die twee moet spook om dié gevleuelde bedreigings se aanvalle af te weer. By die huis is Ma en Pa onbewus van die gevare en dink die twee speel bloot net lekker saam. Kinders sal sélf moet lees om uit te vind of dit net fantasie is, want wat beteken die groot blertse op die klimraam dan?

De Wet Hugo se **Katastrofe** (Human & Rousseau, 2022) is 'n humoristiese avontuurverhaal. Die oulike foto-muur van die verskillende kat-karakters met















hul insiggewende name is reeds 'n aanduiding van die fyn humor en aksie wat wag. So is daar Juffrou Katarina Katoliek, die skoolhoof van Laerskool Katedraal en Leo, die leeuwelpie, seun van Burgemeester Katz.

In Katjiesfontein is Mevrou Mynie Koen se geld, wat sy vir die talentkompetisie geskenk het — van haar lessenaar afgesteel. Leo vermoed dat Spiertier, die boelie, iets daarmee te doen het, want Leo wéét tiere beteken net moeilikheid. Maar hy wonder ook oor Gato, die nuwe, vreemde leerling van Katalonië. Wanneer die aanvanklike bewyse daarop dui dat Leo die dief is, moet hy vinnig daarvan werk maak om sy onskuld te bewys. Hy wil Spiertier uitvang. Intussen hou almal hulle asem op oor wat verder by die talentkompetisie gaan gebeur.

Leo leer 'n les oor aanvaarding en om nie ander te oordeel sonder al die feite nie. Samewerking en vriendskap is ook 'n belangrike tema. **Katastrofe** is 'n genotvolle leesboekie, veral geskik vir lesers tussen 6 en 9 jaar wat reeds onafhanklik kan lees. Dit kan ook as voorleesboek gebruik word deur ouers, grootouers of onderwysers. Die teks is lekker groot gedruk met swart-enwit illustrasies deur Martinus van Tee wat die aksie, humor en karakters beklemtoon. Dit is ook in Engels beskikbaar as **Catfield!**

Daniella van Heerden se jong tienerverhaal, **As jy droom** (Pan MacMillan, 2021) is gebaseer op 'n ware verhaal oor 'n jong Suid-Afrikaanse tienermeisie se droom om 'n vliegtuig saam met ander tieners te bou en daarmee vanaf Kaapstad na Kairo te vlieg. Megan Werner wou ander tieners in Afrika inspireer om ook hul drome na te volg — veral omdat sy op skool geterg is oor haar droom. Haar liefde vir vliegtuie is van jongs af gevorm.

As deel van die *U-Dream Global Project Cape To Cairo* het die groepie tieners die vliegtuig oor 'n tydperk van 'n jaar, onder toesig van ingenieurs, gebou. Daarna moes hulle dit na en van Kaïro vlieg. Die avontuurlike tog is vol spanning en allerlei gebeurlikhede; en vertel van dapperheid, deursettingsvermoë, maar ook hartseer: Megan se pa is oorlede in 'n vliegongeluk in Tanzanië tydens die terugvlug.

As jy droom is 'n impakvolle verhaal wat sy gehoor inspireer om te reik na die sterre. Dis geskik vir lesers tussen 8 en 13 jaar oud.

'n Debuutverhaal vol historiese avonture is **Die geheim van die bloedsteen** (Protea, 2021) deur Antoinette Venter en is ook die eerste boek in die *Kinders van die gode*-reeks wat handel oor antieke gode.

Hierdie verhaal speel af in die antieke Roemeinse tyd. Zenno is 'n doodgewone jong seun van Benoni — of so dink hy. Eendag is hy in sy professor-oom se kantoor wanneer daar iets onverklaarbaar gebeur. Hy word skielik na 'n ander tydvak weggevoer na Pompeii in antieke

Rome waar die Alveoli-draak, wat in die Vesuvius-vulkaan bly, dreig om die stad te verwoes. Zenno vind uit dat hy 'n afstammeling is van Vulcanus, die Romeinse god van vuur — en moet hy saam met die kinders van ander Romeinse gode soos Minerva (godin van wysheid), Mars (god van oorlog) en Venus (godin van liefde) 'n plan beraam om die draak te verslaan voordat die stad verwoes word.

Pragtige illustrasies in swart en wit sketse geskep deur Theodore Key verleen afronding aan dié avontuurverhaal vol intrige geskik vir die ouderdomsgroep ses tot nege jaar.

Chris Riddell se **Bewakers van towerkuns** (Protea, 2021) is vertaal deur Kobus Geldenhuys. Dit is die eerste van 'n nuwe tweeledige avontuurreeks genaamd *Die kroniek van die wolkeperde*. Die skrywer is in Kaapstad gebore en 'n bekroonde Britse illustreerder- en skrywer. Hy is in 2015 aangewys as Brittanje se *Children's Laurette*.

Riddell verweef 'n unieke fantasieverhaal in die Koninkryk van Thrynne waar die sprokies buite beheer raak en towerkrag op onverwagse plekke voorkom. Laasgenoemde is verbode en bring gevaar, want daar is diegene wat dit vir eie gewin wil misbruik; teenoor dié wat dit vrees en wil vernietig.

In die dorpies en stede is daar dreigemente van geweld wanneer Koning Rot en sy volgelinge inwoners afpers en die Klokmaker se bliksoldate tirannie afdwing. Diep in die woud

is die towerbome en reuse wat daar wegkruip, ook nie veilig nie. In hierdie fantasieverhaal staan net drie gewone kinders met drie unieke toorvoorwerpe tussen die behoud van toorkuns en die uitwissing daarvan: Zam, Febe en Batseba onderneem 'n tog om die vyande van die misterieuse wolkeperde op te spoor en te verslaan. Hulle moet leer om saam te werk ten einde te kan terugveg. Elke nuwe hoofstuk stel 'n nuwe karakter bekend totdat die storielyn uitloop op 'n spannende slot. Die boek is veral geskik vir lesers tussen die ouderdomme van nege en 14 jaar.

Die Aksieheld Austin-reeks is welbekend onder jong avontuur lesers en is geskryf deur die bekroonde en gewilde outeur Fanie Viljoen. Ewald is nog in die laerskool, maar is reeds bekend as die ster van die gewilde Austin-aksieprente. In die films is hy die dapper held wat teen die skelms moet veg met sy blitsvinnige vuiste. In Boek Vier, **Doodskreet van die Dino's** (LAPA, 2021), bevind Ewald en sy vriend Cardo hulle diep in 'n Afrikawoud waar die nuutste Austin-rolprent verfilm word.

Die twee maats is beïndruk deur die drie groot lewensgetroue T-rex-robotte wat ook in die film optree. Dan loop dinge skeef wanneer die robot-dino's uithaak en deur die woud begin jaag. Die oerwoud is dig en hulle verloor koers.

Die swart-en-wit tekeninge is raakvat om die aksie uit te beeld. Lesers rondom die ouderdom van 9 jaar sal die beloofde avontuur en spanning geniet. Ander boeke in die reeks is **Operasie** sabotasie (2017), **Nag van grille** (2018) en **Onheil op Skedelbaai** (2019).

'n Historiese tienerreeks in twee dele met die Middeleeue as agtergrond, is **Die brief vir die koning** (Protea, 2021) met die opvolg **Geheime van die Wilde Woud** (Protea, 2021) wat uit Nederlands vertaal is deur Daniel Hugo.

'Antonia "Tonke" Johanna Willemina Dragt (gebore 12 November 1930) is 'n Nederlandse kinderboekskrywer en -illustreerder. **De brief voor de Koning** is in 1963 bekroon met die *Nederlandse Prijs voor het Beste Kinderboek* en met die *Griffel der Griffels 1955-2004*. In 1976 is die *Staatsprijs voor Jeugdliteratuur* aan Tonke Dragt toegeken. Die Nederlandse film **De brief voor de Koning** verskyn in 2008, en die sesdelige Netflix-reeks, *The letter for the king*, in 2020.' (Uitgewersprikkel)

Die titel is in 16 tale vertaal en was uiters gewild in Europa in die sestigerjare.

In die eerste boek, **Die brief vir die koning,** ontmoet die leser die
16-jarige Tiuri wat sy nagwaak en eed van stilswye saam met vier ander jongmanne uitvoer op die vooraand van hul ridderskap. Ná 'n klop aan die deur van die kapel waar hulle saamwag, bring 'n ou man met 'n brief 'n dringende versoek om dit na die Swart-Riddermet-die-Wit-Skild te neem.


Tiuri besluit om gehoor te gee, hoewel hy besef dit kan hom die ridderskap kos, want hy verlaat sy nagwaak en verbreek sy eed van stilswye. In die woud vind hy die Swart Ridder met noodlottige wonde. Met die uitblaas van sy laaste asem versoek die Swart Ridder vir Tiuri om die brief te neem na Koning Unauwen. Met die koning se vyande op sy spoor, raak Tiuri se taak al meer gevaarlik en word hy deur gewelddadige Rooi Ruiters agtervolg wat hom wil doodmaak.

Hy bly in 'n stryd gewikkel om sy sending te voltooi, terwyl dit onseker is of die mense wat hom gehelp het ten volle vertrou kan word. Die verhaal begin aanvanklik stadig om die verhaallyn te vestig, maar kom daarna op dreef met verskeie naelbyt-intriges.

In Boek Twee, **Geheime van die Wilde Woud,** kry Tiuri opdrag om
die vermiste ridder van die koning te
gaan soek. Hy en sy vriend Piak pak
die lewensgevaarlike tog aan na die
betowerde woud. Daar word allerlei
uiteenlopende stories oor die Wilde
Woud rondvertel — van woeste rowers
en bosgeeste, ruïnes en kronkelpaaie
wat doodloop, tot die geheimsinnige
Manne met Groen Klere.

Dis 'n avontuurverhaal propvol aksie; maar ook van 'n vreeslose held, dapperheid, vriendskap, lojaliteit, liefde en ridderlikheid — maar daar is ook skurke waarmee rekening gehou moet word.

In die jong tiener-trilogie, die *Jungu Josh*-reeks, is **Die goue kalbas** (Tafelberg, 2020) die debuuttitel en die eerste in die reeks – geskryf deur









Constant van Graan. Dit handel oor die 13-jarige Josh wat by sy tante op 'n plaas in Oos-Afrika woon nadat sy ma, Sylvia, skielik spoorloos verdwyn.

Wanneer Josh amper deur 'n vreemdeling ontvoer word, red die huishoudster, Doris, hom. Hy verkeer in gevaar en Doris raai hom aan om die wyse ou man, Ngandu, in sy grot te gaan soek. Sy stuur hom na die Kalimbula-Vallei om in 'n stat te gaan wegkruip. Daar ontmoet Josh die 15-jarige jongmeisie, Njeri, wat die vallei goed ken. Saam bereik hulle Ngandu wat hom opdrag gee om na die goue kalbas te gaan soek — maar Josh moet alleen gaan.

Hy vind die goue Kalbas, maar toe dit oopgemaak word, kry hy die verrassing van sy lewe. 'n Verhaal vol fantasie, avontuur, toorkuns en kits-aksie. Ideaal vir seuns tussen 8 en 13 jaar oud.

In Boek Twee, Die kryger van Aboemondia (Tafelberg, 2020), sukkel Josh om sy heerskappy te vestig as die koning van Kalimbula. Die teenwoordigheid van 'n misterieuse kryger met 'n donker verlede en donkerder motiewe, toets Josh se leierskap tot die uiterste. Sy oproep om hulp van die mistieke sifashama met hul rooi mantels en selfs sy aartsvyand, die heks Masjeba, loop op niks uit nie. Intussen wonder hy oor Sylvia, sy moeder, en hy weet nog nie dat sy daarin geslaag het om van die plaas te ontsnap nie. Sy is oppad om haar seun te red voor alles ontknoop, maar dis 'n stryd teen tyd en vyande.

Die waters van Wafu (Tafelberg, 2021) is die derde titel en slotverhaal in die Jungu Josh-aksiereeks. Josh vlug uit Liba en terwyl hy en Charlie ronddwaal, word hulle verwelkom deur die kinders van die misterieuse Geel Woud. Hulle vertoef in Nuwe Jerusalem, die boomdorpie waar Josh aanklank vind by hul leier, Jandja, 'n tienerseun soos hy. Wanneer Josh besef daar is probleme in Kalimbula, weet hy dis tyd om terug te gaan, al is daar vrae oor Njeri se verraad en die rede vir sy tante Verona se obsessie met die waters van Wafu.

Mark Huckerby en Nick Ostler skryf TV-reekse en boeke, het al Emmys gewen vir hulle werk en is ook al benoem vir Bafta-toekennings. Die trilogie genaamd *Redder van die ryk* is 'n tienerfantasiereeks wat uit Engels vertaal is deur Kobus Geldenhuys. Die storielyn handhaaf 'n vinnige pas vol aksie, humor en wilde avontuur. Dié spannende kombinasie behoort byval te vind by teësinnige lesers tussen 8 en 16 jaar oud.

In die eerste boek in die reeks genaamd **Redder van die ryk** (Protea Boekhuis, 2018), ontmoet lesers vir Alfie, 'n tipiese 14-jarige tiener wat net probeer om in die skool te oorleef, maar hy is in werklikheid 'n prins en die troonopvolger van Groot-Brittanje. Hayley is nie so bevoorreg nie en vandat haar ma oorlede is bly sy by haar sieklike ouma. By die Toring van Londen kom sy onverwags 'n vreemde

swart skaal teë wanneer sy 'n mistieke geveg aanskou tussen 'n oeroue vyand, die mitiese Swart Draak- monster; en die legendariese held, Redder van die Ryk.

Die Redder blyk Alfie se pa te wees en sy ontydige dood verhef Alfie tot die volgende koning. Dit bring ook gevaar mee, want hy moet voldoen aan die eeue-oue geheime wat met die koningskap gepaardgaan, naamlik om self die Redder van die Ryk te word. Somber temas soos Alfie se pa se dood, Hayley se ouma wat ouetehuis toe gaan en sy wat haarself in pleegsorg bevind, word op 'n ligter trant aangebied.

Die donker eeu (Protea Boekhuis, 2020) is Boek Twee in die Redder van die ryk-reeks. Na die groot geveg tydens Koning Alfie se inhuldiging, leer hy wat dit beteken om die koning van Groot-Brittanje te wees. Onrus vat pos wanneer 'n groep spookagtige Vikings verskyn. Alfie moet 'n plan bedink om hulp te kry.

Die koning se weermag (Protea boekhuis, 2020) is Boek Drie en die slothoofstuk in die Redder van die ryk-trilogie. Na die Redder se verlore stryd teen die Swart Draak bevind die Verenigde Koninkryk homself onder die heerskappy van Professor Lock, met spokerige Vikings en monsters wat die land oorgeneem het. Koning Alfie moet 'n weermag op die been bring om sy land terug te neem, maar dis 'n onbegonne taak. Terwyl Hayley 'n rebellie lei in die agterstrate van


















Londen soek Alfie by vriende hulp. Sê nou dis presies wat die bose Lock wil hê hy moet doen?

Justin Fortuin, skattejagter (LAPA, 2020) deur Theresa van Baalen is Boek Een in 'n fantasie- en avontuurreeks waar lesers die jong Justin Fortuin ontmoet. Justin is glad nie lus om saam met sy ma by haar tannie, Mary, in haar stokou klipkasteel by die strand te gaan kuier nie. Hy verander egter gou van deuntije wanneer Tannie Mary vir hom 'n pratende papegaai present gee. Saam beleef hulle allerlei opwindende avonture met geheimsinnige gebeure. Daar is temas van spoke, diewe, raaisels en skatte wat gevind moet word. Dis geskik vir jong lesers van 11 jaar en ouer en sal meestal deur seuns geniet word.

Justin kuier nog steeds saam met sy ma by Tannie Mary in die geheimsinnige Kasteel Boekanier in die tweede boek **Justin Fortuin, Seerower** (LAPA, 2020). Op 'n reënerige dag ontdek Justin en sy vriend Liam geheime tonnels onder die kasteel. Wanneer hulle die derde tonnel verken, ontdek hulle 'n ou seilskip wat in 'n geheime baai geanker is. Iemand word op die skip gevange gehou en hulle wonder of die misterieuse kok dalk 'n seerower kan wees.

En dan is daar die kwessie van die erfgenaam van Kaptein Verwoes se skat wat verder 'n kinkel in die storie plaas. Justin besluit om die raaisels te ontrafel. Theresa van Baalen is onder meer bekend vir die *Sanri Steyn*-reeks wat 'n speurreeks vir meisies is. Daarteenoor is die *Justin Fortuin*-reeks op seuns gemik.

Jeff Kinney is 'n skrywer wat geen bekendstelling nodig het nie, want sy reeks oor Rowley Jefferson (*Diary of wimpy kid*) is wêreldwyd bekend. In 'n bykomende reeks is Boek Een **Dagboek van 'n vreeslike vriendelike outjie**: **Rowley Jefferson se joernaal** (Puffin Books, 2019). Die reeks word vertaal deur Tinus Horn. Dieselfde komiese grafiese styl is teenwoordig in die groter lettertipe teks met bypassende swart-en-wit sketse wat lesers ken uit *Dagboek van 'n wimpy kid-*faam.

Die reeks is geskik vir die ouderdomsgroep tussen 8 en 12 jaar.

'In Dagboek van 'n vreeslike vriendelike outjie skryf Greg se beste vriend, die vrolike Rowley Jefferson, oor sy wedervaringe en stem in om sy vriend se lewensverhaal neer te pen. (Greg gaan immers eendag ryk en beroemd wees, en dan gaan mense alles van hom wil weet). Maar dit wil lyk asof Rowley nie 'n goeie keuse vir die taak is nie, en sy "biografie" van Greg vertel meer van hom as van sy beste vriend. Dagboek van 'n vreeslike vriendelike outjie: Rowley Jefferson se joernaal laat lesers uit 'n ander hoek na die wimpy kid-wêreld kyk... (wordsworth.co.za)

Rowley Jefferson se vreeslike vriendelike avontuur (Puffin Books, 2020) is die tweede boek in dié avontuur-reeks. Rowley wil 'n boek skryf wat sy ouers met trots saans vir hom sal kan voorlees. Dit moet 'n goeie boek wees en hy vra die hulp van sy beste vriend Greg om te help met die publikasie. Rowley is nie ingestel op beroemdheid of rykdom nie, maar Greg droom van somme geld en filmverwerkings; en die verhaal wissel tussen Rowley se storie en Greg se redigering daarvan. Die avontuur handel oor jong Roland wat saam met Garg die Barbaar vertrek op 'n soek-en-redding-sending om Roland se ma uit die mag van die Hardekwas Heksemeester te gaan red. Allerlei fiktiewe karakters en komiese avonture lei die verhaal telkens na 'n onverwagse wending wat die redigeringsessies in prettige vermaak laat ontaard.

Boek Drie is Rowley Jefferson se vreeslike vriendelike spookstories (Puffin Books, 2021). 'Gryp 'n flitslig, trek die beddegoed oor jou kop en verdiep jou in Rowley Jefferson se verwronge verbeelding, wat onverwags ook skreeusnaaks is. 

Shuggie Bain.- Picador, 2020.

'While Glaswegian Stuart's first novel begins with, ends with, and is titled for young Shuggie Bain, the book, like Shuggie himself, revolves around Shuggie's mother, Agnes. In the 1980s and early 1990s in Glasgow, Agnes can't hide her alcoholism any more than Shuggie can fit in with other kids.

'They and Shuggie's taxi driver father, the original Shug, live in an apartment with Agnes' parents until Shug moves them into a moldy little house on the outskirts of a defunct coal mine and jumps the family ship. Left to her own devices in gloomy, gossipy Pithead, Agnes maintains an elegant appearance and a round-theclock buzz, while Shuggie becomes an expert in studying their meager government benefits and his mother's many moods. He finds a precarious foothold as Agnes' caretaker and slowly builds his defenses against those who call him "a wee poof" and do him physical harm.




















nephew, Nicky Castone — also live in the family home.




Face to face: true stories of life, death and transformation from my career as a facial surgeon.- Bantam, 2018.

McCaul also restores patients' appearance as much as possible after disfiguring accidents. Here he pulls back the curtain on the everyday details of his work life: everything from his footwear (white Crocs that soon become stained with blood and other fluids) to his musical choices (pop for the early phases; classical for the more challenging microsurgery stage). Like neurosurgeon Henry Marsh, he describes the awe of the first incision: an almost overwhelming sense of entering into a sanctuary. 

LEVITHAN, David and NIVEN, Jennifer Take me with you when you go.- Penguin Books, 2021.

'Teenage sibs desperately search for ways to escape a toxic domestic situation. When his big sister, Bea, disappears just two months before her Indiana high school graduation, leaving him without an ally at home against their passive-aggressive mom and viciously abusive stepfather, 15-year-old Ezra oscillates between rage and terror — even after Bea emails that she's (more or less) OK.

'Fortunately, Ezra can look to his boyfriend, Terrence, and other outside allies for support when the punishments and public scenes get to be too much. Bea has walled off everyone except her beloved little brother and has, it turns out, quixotically set out on a quest of her own ... only to discover that their mother hasn't been exactly straight about important elements of their family history. The authors frame this heartbreaking outing through emails of frequently monumental length and a relentless focus on either pep talks or event and relationship analysis.

'Perceptive readers who make it through the emotional wringer will encounter certain themes: that people and the reasons for what they do are rarely if ever simple; that adolescence can be scary but exhilarating (the solid, healthy bond between Ezra and Terrence being a case in point); and that seeing oneself clearly is a first step toward real change. Ultimately, Ezra and Bea come to understand that it's better to be running toward the future than from the past ... A wrenching, if logorrheic, epistolary portrait of a dysfunctional family.' 'A polar bear parent speaks poetically of love for a child. A genderless adult and cub travel through the landscapes of an arctic year. Each of the softly rendered double-page paintings has a very different feel and colour palette as the pair go through the seasons,

walking through wintry ice and snow and green summer meadows, cavorting in the blue ocean, watching whales, and playing beside musk oxen.

'The rhymes of the four-line stanzas are not forced, as is the case too often in picture books of this type: "When cold, winter winds / blow the leaves far and wide, / You'll cross the great icebergs / with me by your side." On a dark, snowy night, the loving parent says: "But for now, cuddle close / while the stars softly shine. / I'll always be yours, / and you'll always be mine." As the last illustration shows the pair curled up for sleep, young listeners will be lulled to sweet dreams by the calm tenor of the pictures and the words.

'While far from original, this timeless theme is always in demand, and the combination of delightful illustrations and poetry that scans well make this a good choice for early-childhood classrooms, public libraries, and one-on-one home read-aloud. Parent-child love and affection, appealingly presented, with the added attraction of the seasonal content and lack of gender restrictions.' (kirkusreviews.com)

JAMIESON, Victoria and MOHAMED, Omar

When stars are scattered/illustrated by Iman Geddy.- Faber & Faber, 2020. 'A Somali boy living in a refugee camp

in Kenya tries to make a future for himself and his brother in this near memoir interpreted as a graphic novel by collaborator Jamieson. Omar Mohamed lives in Dadaab Refugee Camp in Kenya with his younger brother, Hassan, who has a seizure disorder, and Fatuma, an elderly woman assigned to foster them in their parents' absence. The boys' father was killed in Somalia's civil war, prompting them to flee on foot when they were separated from their mother. They desperately hope she is still alive and looking for them, as they are for her. The book covers six years, during which Omar struggles with decisions about attending school and how much hope to have about opportunities to resettle in a new land, like the United States.

'Through Omar's journey, and those of his friends and family members, readers get a close, powerful view of the trauma and uncertainty that attend life as a refugee as well as the faith, love, and support from unexpected quarters that get people through it. Jamieson's characteristically endearing art, warmly coloured by Geddy, perfectly complements Omar's story, conjuring memorable and sympathetic characters who will stay with readers long after they close the book. Photographs of the brothers and an afterword provide historical

context; Mohamed and Jamieson each contribute an author's note. This engaging, heartwarming story does everything one can ask of a book, and then some.' (kirkusreviews.com)

Online meetings and training: the good, the bad and how to make the best of it

ne of the few positive outcomes of the COVID-19 pandemic is that it forced us to start working online. Certainly, in the following months, some were a bit reticent to the strangeness of only meeting people on a screen. On the other hand, I have since found myself in some physical meetings where I wished it was rather online for various reasons.

But neither time nor technology stand still and since then the software used to meet online has constantly improved, and those who do not use it often enough may still prefer physical meetings.

Remote meetings can be even more effective than in-person meetings.

Advantages of online meetings

- 1. No transport is needed, which saves costs.
- No time is spent on getting to a meeting, like walking or driving to a venue
- 3. No catering is needed, so it is costeffective
- Meetings are interactive and allow the possibility of smaller or larger work groups, but depend on the commitment to sharing of ideas by all attendees.
- Attendees can add to a meeting's progress by texting messages or indicating approval with emojis, which would not be possible in physical meetings.

- Participants can view content closely on a screen and not far away from a PowerPoint presentation of a physical meeting, which tends to create disengagement.
- The meeting can be recorded and revisited at a later stage; or used as training content or played to staff who could not attend.
- Speakers can be invited to contribute valuable content from anywhere in the country or the world, which would otherwise not be possible and mostly free of charge, because there is no cost involved except their time.
- Staff can attend meetings where there is low capacity owing to personnel shortages. Those who would normally not be able to attend meetings can attend cherrypicked parts of forums or Q&A sessions only.
- It is convenient because meetings can be presented or attended from anywhere.
- 11. Productivity is enhanced, because more can be done when staff are not taken out of the office. Screen sharing contributes to collaboration, focused discussions and real-time feedback. This is in contrast to physical meetings, where some people are passive listeners and may find it difficult to stay focused and tune out completely because of a lack of engagement or visual cues.
- 12. Participants with disabilities or limited mobility can easily attend virtual meetings without facing the challenges of accessing physical meeting spaces.
- 13. Meetings can be arranged and attended at very short notice.
- 14. Staff can be assisted with equipment and training to collaborate better with online meetings.
- 15. No presentation aids like a projector or sound equipment are needed.
- Participants can sit in a comfortable environment with their own notes and tools as needed.
- Higher attendance is possible due to easy access and convenience of selective arrival and departure.
- 18. Online meetings tend to be more focused and time-efficient.



- 19. Online meetings are more environmentally friendly because of less traveling and lower carbon emissions, as well as no need for printed handouts.
- 20. The meeting can be followed on multiple devices, such as those who are travelling can attend using a cell phone
- 21. Online meetings do not limit the size of the meeting, but may be more effective for certain purposes. Small meetings for discussions and workshops are best with less than ten people and larger gatherings work well for webinars or broadcasts.

Disadvantages of online meetings

- Load shedding could add interruptions or to meetings being cancelled entirely.
- 2. Poor network connectivity impacts meeting participation.
- 3. Attendees may be online but tune out. Multi-tasking is distracting.
- 4. Equipment without audio-visual capacity negatively impacts the meeting experience.

- Attendees do not always practice online meeting etiquette, which contributes to poor experiences. This includes raising a virtual hand to speak, muting microphones when not speaking and deactivating one's camera when not needed.
- Virtual meetings lack the full range of non-verbal cues, such as body language, facial expressions and eye contact. These are some of the strongest justifications in favour of physical meetings.
- The web version of the meeting software used is not always as userfriendly as fully installed versions.
- 8. Owed to their ease of arranging, poorly timed long or back-to-back meetings can be strenuous, which can cause reduced attentiveness, mental or physical exhaustion because of extended times of concentration. (Screen fatigue)
- Meetings with audiovisual content may be data-intensive and cause streaming disruptions when network access is not adequate.
- Staff who are not comfortable with technology or lack digital skills may be uncomfortable to participate

- in meetings. (Although this will change over time with regular participation or training.)
- Non-responsiveness of attendees can seem as if no one is participating, which can be bothersome for the speaker.
- 12. Group work and interactive discussions or brainstorming may possibly not be as effective in a virtual situation; and are determined by levels of attendee confidence.

One of the greatest issues with online meetings is that people are not present in the meeting; and that their attention is elsewhere, which defeats the purpose of the meeting to be informed or for meaningful contributions.

Would you believe that over 98% of the knowledge workers we surveyed admitted to multitasking during virtual meetings? Perhaps more surprising, only 14% claimed they only did so rarely.



Tips for a better online meeting experience

For attendees:

- Don't be late. You may miss something important and meetings follow a set agenda. Being late can disrupt the flow and cause them to run longer than expected.
- Avoid multitasking. Focus on the meeting, participate and take notes if needed.
- Mute your microphone when not talking. While you might not be sharing, background noise can be distracting. Loud conversations of colleagues or other ambient noise might distract co-attendees who are trying to listen to the person speaking.
- Take notes. This is to get the most out of the meeting and preserve for future quick reference.
- Notify others if you have to leave before the end of the meeting in the chat box. This will alert the facilitator when your input is required for certain conversation

- content, who will then aim to prioritise your participation or fast-track conversations.
- Choose to participate from an environment with the least disturbances.
- Make sure your internet connection and equipment is working.
- 8. Raise your hand to speak and lower it again once done.
- Keep the camera switched off, except when requested to switch it on or when the meeting protocol requires such action.

For presenters:

- Change meeting settings to allow people without the need to be admitted through the lobby and being announced with a ping, as such arrivals can be very distracting.
- Request to see faces initially or later in a long meeting to make it more personable.
- 3. The presenter should have their camera switched on all the time.
- 4. Get **background support** from a colleague who can:
 - a. check for raised hands
 - field questions or comments on the chat for a less disruptive meeting experience by attendees
 - c. mute someone in the meeting with a noisy microphone
 - d. confirm that all sound levels are correct, files are being shared and visible
- A chairperson or facilitator must indicate the participants to speak to allow everyone a turn, and without being interrupted.
- The room where the chairperson sits should be well-lit, otherwise the video feed will be unclear.
- The facilitator can do a dry run before the actual meeting to ensure they are comfortable with sharing presentations and that the audiovisual component is working well.
- Take a break. This will assist attendees to focus better.

- Clean up your desktop and close other apps if you'll be screensharing.
- 10. Indicate the rules of the meeting in the first chat.
- 11. Change setting options of the meeting beforehand to allow for attendance registers, recording, participation, and so on.
- 12. **PowerPoint or other shared documents** are power contact
 points and help attendees to focus.
- 13. Stick to the time limit.
- Keep a central knowledge database.

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

A great place to start would be to look at the many ways in which we can make best use of the books that are available on Libby. The ultimate goal for me is to seek ways in which to improve our effectiveness as librarians. It is worth repeating the saying: To work smarter and not harder in our jobs. Our librarianship degrees will only take us so far. What I would like to do is to uncover additional tools that can be used to fine-tune and update our existing knowledge. We have the basic foundation ... so now what?

Let's pause and take a moment for you to reflect on the skills and knowledge that you have acquired thus far in your career. Next, you need to think of how you might add to and fill missing gaps to advance your careers. To be fully effective in our jobs requires various skills that:

- 1. Help us to work as a team with our colleagues, and
- 2. Deliver customer service that our patrons need.

The information landscape is changing at an incredibly fast pace. To survive and thrive as a librarian you will need most of these so-called soft skills:

- customer service skills
- the ability to work well with others
- to be flexible and open to change
- administration skills
- knowledge of English language
- the ability to use your initiative
- sensitivity and understanding
- patience and the ability to remain calm in stressful situations.

A recent Sabinet newsletter mentioned that the Department of Higher Education and Training has released the highly anticipated 2024 National List of Occupations in High Demand. In it they identify 'professions with a critical skills shortage in South Africa'. It's now time for you to sit up and take notice because 'according to the National List, librarians are now considered a profession that is in high demand'. It should not be a surprise to you, but I do hope that you are encouraged by this news.

Our development as professionals means fully utilising both print and online resources. In the same way, our service commitment to our customers means that we must help them to discover all the resources that are available in both print and online. The Cape Librarian contains articles exploring the book collections, but now it is time to look to Libby, the new kid on the block. We start this exploratory journey by shining a light on the contributing role that Libby can play in a few critical areas:

- Lifelong learning and continuing education
- 2. Technological knowledge and skills
- 3. Self-improvement and mental health.

Lifelong learning and continuing education


















Try to expand your non-fiction reading material to expose related subjects and making it more broad-based. In this way, you will enrich your work life and uncover gems like:


