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Will the current NHI Bill achieve **Universal Health Coverage?**





Our country believes that access to healthcare is a human right. This means every single one of us is entitled to receive healthcare. It should not depend on how rich we are or where we happen to live. The right to obtain healthcare is written into our Constitution.



What is Universal Health Coverage?

Universal Health Coverage (UHC) is achieved when all people who need health services (promotion, prevention, treatment, rehabilitation, and palliation) have access to quality care, without undue financial hardship.



- Quality- healthcare at an acceptable standard. Patients are able to achieve health gains.
- Access- all people have reasonable access to health Affordability services. There is adequate coverage of health services.
 - Affordability- Healthcare does not result in financial difficulty or distress.



What is NHI?

National Health Insurance (NHI) is **LINKED** to Universal Health Coverage (UHC), but not exactly the same thing

NHI is a funding instrument

- It's the same as an insurance policy like OUTsurance or a medical fund like Discovery.
- You pay money into the fund, and the fund buys medical care.

Do we need NHI?

• The important thing to understand, is to achieve Universal Health Coverage, you need a sound workable funding mechanism, which NHI will attempt to do.

What is in the current NHI bill?

- The NHI Bill seeks to establish the National Health Insurance Fund of South Africa (NHI Fund), outlining its duties, functions and powers.
- It further provides for the CONTROL of the NHI Fund by a Board.
- The aim is to move towards UHC

What does the NHI Fund do?

- The fund will be a single purchaser and single payer of health care services.
- The fund will purchase services ie: central purchasing such as medicines which are currently done centrally
- The Western Cape currently purchases contracts for 16 000 items and makes use of contracted NGO's, etc.



The NHI and access to healthcare (ACCESS)

- Users must enter at the PHC level, and follow referral pathways.
- Treatment will only be funded if it is deemed necessary, cost effective and is included in the formulary.
- The NHI Bill does not provide information on the package of services/benefits that the NHI will cover.



PRIMARY HEALTH CARE

Where is the power vested?

- The NHI fund will be governed by the NHI Board, accountable to the National Minister of Health.
- The 11 Board members will be appointed by the Minister of Health.
- A CEO will be the administrative head accountable to the Board, takes all decisions related to rights of users; establish an Investigating Unit

MINISTER OF HEALTH

Management of the NHI Fund

- A CEO will be the administrative head of the NHI Fund
- Accountable to the Board.
- Takes all decisions related to rights of users
- Responsible for all income and expenditure

NHI Fund

- The total NHI Fund will ultimately be more than R500billion
- Provinces will lose its equitable share to the Fund

The role of provinces in the NHI bill?

- Province will only have 3 functions;
 - Emergency medical services and forensic pathology services.
 - Environmental and pollution control services.
 - Health and medical services during provincial disasters.

What will the Western Cape NOT control?

- Central Hospitals within provinces will report directly to the National Department of Health.
- The Fund will contract directly with health service providers e.g. general practitioners, private hospitals, regional hospitals, as well as district management teams and private providers.

Areas of concern

- Quality and access will be impacted
- Fragmented services/split between PHC and Hospitals
- Accountability to citizens not clear
- To whom will Aunty Sarah complain?
- Provincial Parliament's role unclear
- A range of provincial health functions are withdrawn
