2.	LAND COVER AND LAND USE INITIATIVE

AP expressed the interest by NGI to work together with (DRDLR: SPI) in order to meet their set objectives. AP discussed some of the setbacks that would pose as a problem for the project, mentioning: Rural areas with no cadastral Funds to capture data at such a detailed level	АР
