It also features the Haka, a younger Nelson Mandela wearing a Springbok jersey with captain François Pienaar's number 6 on the back and obviously the 15 men that the whole of South Africa supported. It is a very emotional film to watch. Relive the whole match including the unprecedented 20 minutes extra time. It is an extraordinary experience.

There are few countries throughout the

world where rugby means as much as it does to the people of South Africa. Their 1995 World Cup triumph offered the whole nation the chance to celebrate together for

the first time and it gave the sport the opportunity to grow.

This exciting DVD follows the fortunes of the Springboks over the past ten years, paying particular attention to their involvement in the now world-renowned Tri-Nations Series. The viewer is taken on a rollercoaster ride, reliving



all of South Africa's successes and failures, including the Springboks' awe-inspiring series wins in 1998 and 2004. It features the best action from the last decade of South African rugby and includes interviews with Springbok greats such as Gary Teichman, Chester Williams, Jean de Villiers and many, many more. the semi between France and the All Blacks at Twickenham in 1999. Perhaps you might consider the moment that President Nelson Mandela walked onto the Ellis Park turf for the 1995 final wearing a Springbok jersey. Through the medium of interviews and action shots, **The Rugby World Cup golden moments** includes all the most memorable action, including the record points tallies, and the breathless finishes. There's a special bonus for all rugby fans with extended highlights of some of the very best matches.

This DVD is a very special accompaniment to the sport's top tournaments. It includes The 2003 World Cup final; Nelson Mandela visiting the Springboks in 1995; Wales beating Australia in 1987; Ireland playing Australia in 1991; Scotland playing England in the 1991 semi-final; and New Zealand winning the first World Cup.

History of rugby / producer and director, Stephen Gammond

Rugby has had one of the most romantic births of any sport. Not content with starting life as a full-blown, planned event, it took a young Englishman called William Webb Ellis to decide in 1823 that instead of kicking



the ball he would pick it up and run with it.

From that day at Rugby school, a new sport took its place in our heritage: a sport that would be enjoyed by more than 100 nations across the globe.

Since 1823 Rugby Union has enjoyed

revolution after revolution, from its break from Rugby League in its move to professionalism and the event of the Six Nations Championship.

The game has produced some of sport's most famous English players, from Gareth Edwards and Barry John to Bill Beaumont, Will Carling and the current superstar Jonny Wilkinson. It has also produced two of the most famous international teams, the British and Irish Lions, particularly the teams of 1971 and 1974, and the world-renowned Barbarians who ran from their own try line in 1973 to score the most famous try the game has ever seen.

This DVD takes you through the entire history of rugby from its inception right through to the resurgent England team of the new Millennium who beat Australia, New Zealand All Blacks and South Africa Springboks before winning the 2003
