The exhibition showcases the many interventions that have been driven under each of the Game Changers:

- Expanding Apprenticeships
- Implementing quality eLearning at schools
- Expanding quality After School programmes
- Achieving Energy Security
- Reducing Alcohol Related Harms

- Delivering High Speed Broadband
- Pioneering an affordable integrated housing project called the Conradie Better Living Model

The exhibits also highlight the successes we have achieved so far.

It also includes an update on the provincial government's economic growth and job creation strategy - Project Khulisa.

After School leadership excellence award

Mr Terence Adams, principal of Grosvenor Primary School in Atlantis, was awarded Gold in the Leadership Excellence in After School programming category at the recent provincial ceremony of the National Teaching Awards.

In its third year of being presented, this special ministerial award recognises principals who have opened their schools to embrace a range of after school activities and ensure their learners reach their full potential.

These ideally include a mix of sport, arts and culture, academic support and life skills programmes creating opportunities for every learner.

Grosvenor Primary offers exactly this, a range of programmes run by enthusiastic teachers and external partners.

Mr Adams works tirelessly to continue adding new activities, so all learners are enticed to participate regularly in after school programmes.

He has also focused on getting parents more involved in ensuring the success of the school. For example, he has initiated termly karaoke evenings, which raise funds and encourages parent buy-in.

The Apprenticeship Game Changer is focused on increasing the number of qualified technical and vocationally skilled people to meet the needs of our prioritised economic growth sectors, namely Tourism, Oil and Gas, Agri-processing, ICT and Renewable Energy sector; by 2019.


The target is set for 11 037 learners entering workplace based training opportunities and 13 221 qualified apprentices entering the labour market.

We have been running career awareness campaigns in our Technical High and Maths and Science Schools and have also been working with Employers to create more workplace based learning opportunities.

9 339 learners have entered work place based learning including apprenticeships and 7 416 learners have successfully qualified by September 2018.



Green Home Checklist launched
