

Demographics

Population

The population of Bitou is 69 321 people in 2021, making it the most populated municipal area in the Garden Route District (GRD). This total is expected to grow to 77 243 by 2025, equating to an average annual growth rate of 2.7 per cent.

Sex Ratio

The overall sex ratio depicts the number of males per 100 females in the population. The data indicates that there are slightly more females than males in the Bitou municipal area with a ratio of 51.2 per cent (females) to 48.8 per cent (males). The number of males per 100 females for Bitou is expected to increase slightly year on year towards 2024 which could be attributed to in-migration of working males to the Bitou municipal area.

Age Cohorts

Between 2021 and 2025, the largest population growth is projected in the 0-14 years of age cohort which is expected to grow at an annual average rate of 3.0 per cent, compared to a growth of 2.7 per cent in the working age population and 1.9% per cent in the aged population. These predicted growth rates increases the dependency ratio from 48.1 in 2021 to 48.3 in 2025. Higher dependency places strain on the income of the working age population.

Household sizes

Household size refers to the number of people per household. The actual size of households is forecasted to decline from 3.7 people per household in 2021 to 2.9 in 2025. Contributing factors to a reduction in household size could include, but are not limited to, lower fertility rates, ageing population, construction of smaller households, etc. Smaller household sizes often lead to a greater demand for housing as the population grows..

Population density

Amidst rapid urbanisation across the Western Cape, population density figures will aid public sector decision makers to mitigate environmental, individual health and service delivery risks. In 2021, the population density of the Bitou municipal area was more than 50 persons per square kilometre. In order of lowest to highest, the various local municipal areas in the GRD compare as follows:

Learner enrolment, the learner-teacher ratio and learner retention rate

Learner enrolment in Bitou increased by 0.8 per cent annually from 8 376 in 2018 to 8 723 in 2020. This annual average increase is lower than the District annual average growth rate of 1.1 per cent and is reflective of the high 0-14 age population growth rate. The learner teacher ratio at 32.3; the highest in the GRD and is stagnant when compared to 2018. The learner retention rate in Bitou is on an upward trend, declining from 56.8 per cent in 2018 to 52.4.0 per cent in 2019 and then increasing to 65.3 per cent in 2020.

Number of schools

In 2020, Bitou had a total of 11 public ordinary schools. The high learner-teacher ratio in Bitou schools could perhaps be an indication that there are not enough class-room space within the Bitou area.

Number of no-fee schools


Given the tough economic climate, schools have been reporting an increase in parents being unable to pay their school fees. To alleviate some of the funding challenges the Western Cape Department of Education (WCED) offered certain fee-paying schools an opportunity to become no-fee schools. The Bitou municipal area has an increasing proportion of no fee schools, with 81.8 per cent of schools being registered with the Western Cape Department of Education as no-fee schools in 2020. Note that Bitou has the third highest proportion of no fee schools in the District.

Schools with libraries and media centres

Schools with libraries and media centres within Bitou have remained constant at 7 from 2018 until 2020. Access to libraries and media centres can have a positive impact on the overall quality of education.

Education Outcomes (Matric Pass Rates)

Education remains one of the key avenues through which the state is involved in the economy. In preparing individuals for future engagement in the labour market, policy choices and decisions in the sphere of education play a critical role in determining the extent to which future economic and poverty reduction plans can be realised. Bitou's matric outcomes have remained consistently above 80 per cent in line with the district's performance from 2018 to 2020.



Health

Healthcare Facilities

According to the 2019 Inequality Trend report by Statistics South Africa, 75.1 per cent of households in South Africa usually use public healthcare facilities when a household member gets ill compared to 24.9 per cent who use some private healthcare facilities in 2017. This is associated with the low proportion of households with access to Medical Aid, at 16.9 per cent for South Africa and 25 per cent for the Western Cape in 2017. In terms of healthcare facilities, the Bitou municipal area had 6 primary healthcare clinics and one community day centre in 2020/21, the primary health care clinics comprises of 4 fixed and 2 mobile clinics.

Emergency Medical Services

Provision of more operational ambulances can provide greater coverage of emergency medical services. The Bitou municipal area had 7 ambulances per 10 000 inhabitants in 2020 which exceeds the District average. It is worth noting that this number only refers to Provincial ambulances and excludes all private service providers.

HIV/AIDS and TB

Bitou's total registered patients receiving anti retroviral treatment (ART) increased by 67 patients between 2019/20 and 2020/21. A total of 26 996 registered patients received ART in the Garden Route District in 2020/21. Bitou, at 3 502 patients, represents 12.9 per cent of the patients receiving ART in the Garden Route District.

The Bitou municipal area experienced a significant decline in tuberculosis (TB) cases from 2019/20 to 2020/21. 271 TB patients were registered in 2020/21 compared to 3057 in 2018/19.

Child Health

Immunisation rates in the Bitou municipal area is recorded at 54.9 per cent ; lower than that of the Garden Route District at 68.9 per cent in 2020/21. The Immunisation rate for Bitou has however increased significantly from the 2017/18 rate of 47.1 per cent. The number of malnourished children under five years (per 100 000) in Bitou in 2020/21 was 0.3, a deterioration from the 2019/20 rate of 0,0. The Neonatal mortality rate (per 1 000 live births) in the Bitou municipal area remained constant at 0.0 from 2018/19 to 2020/21. The low birth weight rate was recorded at 0.0 from 2019/20 to 2020/21.


Maternal Health

The maternal mortality rate in the Bitou municipal area was 0.0 per 100 000 live births in 2020/21. The maternal mortality rate is lower than the Garden Route District rate of 121,5 as recorded in 2020/21.

The delivery rate to women under 19 years in Bitou was recorded 0.0 per cent in 2020/21 and is lower than the District rate of 14.7 per cent. Teen delivery to women between 10-19 years remains constant 0.0 between 2016/17 and 2020/21.


The termination of pregnancy rate has also remained constant from 2016/17 to 2020/21 within the Bitou municipal area. Conversely, the District had a higher teen delivery rate but lower levels of terminations.

Poverty

GDPR Per Capita

An increase in real GDPR per capita, i.e., GDPR per person, is experienced only if the real economic growth rate exceeds the population growth rate.

At R61 645 in 2020, Bitou's GDPR per capita are below that of the GRD's figure of R72 291 and the Western Cape figure of R84 967. It is positive to note that GDP per capita has been on an upward trend, despite the sluggish economy between 2014 to 202017 and dropped slightly to R61 645 in 2020.


Income Inequality

Even though real GDP per capita reflects changes in the overall well-being of the population, the money will not be equally distributed across the population. The National Development Plan (NDP) has set a target of reducing income inequality in South Africa from a Gini coefficient of 0.7 in 2010 to 0.6 by 2030. Income inequality has increased in Bitou from 0.64 in 2014 to 0.67 in 2020 and is therefore underperforming against the 2030 NDP goal. It is however higher than the GRD Gini coefficient of 063.

Human Development

The United Nations uses the Human Development Index (HDI) to assess the relative level of socioeconomic development in countries. Indicators that measure human development are education levels, income and health. It is a measure of peoples' ability to live a long and healthy life, to communicate, participate in the community and to have sufficient means to be able to afford a decent living. The HDI is represented by a number between 0 and 1, where 1 indicates a high level of human development and 0 represents no human development.

There has been a general increase in the HDI in the Bitou municipal area from 0.71 in 2012 to 0.74 in 2018. The trend for the Garden Route District has been similar. The rise in the HDI is attributed to an increase in the GDP per capita, literacy rates and life expectancy since 2012.



Basic Service Delivery

The Constitution stipulates that every citizen has the right to access to adequate housing and that the state must take reasonable legislative and other measures within its available resources to achieve the progressive realisation of this right. Access to housing also includes access to services such as potable water, basic sanitation, safe energy sources and refuse removal services, to ensure that households enjoy a decent standard of living.

This section considers to what extent this has been achieved by reflecting on the latest available information from Quantec Research for 2019. The latest official statistics was collected by Statistics South Africa for the 2016 Community Survey; the 2021 Census will provide the updated official statistics. The information on free basic services is obtained from Statistics South Africa's Non-Financial Census of Municipalities survey findings.

Housing and Household Services

With a total of 17 892 households in the Bitou municipal area, 71.1 per cent had access to formal housing, the lowest when compared with other municipalities in the GRD area. The District average was 82.7 per cent. Considering the high level of households living in informal dwellings (25.7 per cent), access to formal housing is a challenge in the Bitou municipal area.

Even though there was a relatively low proportion of households living in formal dwellings, service access levels were significantly higher, with access to piped water inside/within 200m of the dwelling at 92.3 per cent, access to a flush or chemical toilet at 83.6 per cent, access to electricity (for lighting) at 94.1 per cent and the removal of refuse at least weekly by local authority at 88.1 per cent of households. These access levels were above the District averages for all services except for access to a flush or chemical toilet (83.6 per cent).

Free Basic Services

Municipalities also provide a package of free basic services to households who are financially vulnerable and struggle to pay for services. The number of households receiving free basic services in the Bitou municipal area has shown significant decreases from 2018 to 2019 in all services. The stressed economic conditions are anticipated to exert pressure on household income levels, which is in turn likely to see the number of indigent households and the demand for free basic services increase in the upcoming years.

Safety and Security

Murder

Murder is defined as the unlawful and intentional killing of another person.

Within the Bitou municipal area, the number of murders decreased annually from 21 in 2018/19 to 11 in 2020/21. The murder rate (per 100 000 people) decreased from 32 in 2018/19 to 17 in 2020/21. The murder rate for the Garden Route District also declined (215 in 2018/19 and 163 in 2020/21) and is higher than that of the Bitou area. The murder rate in Bitou is the fourth lowest in the Garden Route District. 2017's global murder rate was 6.1 (per 100 000 people) and is significantly below the reports within both the District and the Municipality.

Sexual Offences

Sexual offences include rape (updated to the new definition of rape to provide for the inclusion of male rape), sex work, pornography, public indecency and human trafficking.

In 2020/21, there were 78 sexual offences in the Bitou area, equating to 112 cases per 100 000 people. This is lower levels than those reported in the GRD of 133 cases per 100 000 people. South Africa is amongst the top 5 countries in the world with respect to reports of rape, therefore it is a huge problem that needs to be addressed.

Drug-related Offences

Drug-related crimes refer to the situation where the perpetrator is found to be in possession of, under the influence of, or selling illegal drugs.

Drug-related crime within the Bitou municipal area reduced drastically from 352 cases in 2018/19 to 245 cases in 2020/21 and is largely attributed to the decriminalisation of marijuana. When considering the rate per 100 000 people, it declined from 538 to 354 in Bitou. The District had a higher incidence of drug-related offences with 563 cases per 100 000 people in 2020/21.

Driving under the influence (DUI)

A situation where the driver of a vehicle is found to be over the legal blood alcohol limit.

The number of cases per 100 000 people of driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs in the Bitou area shows a declining trend from 137 in 2019/20 to 57 in 2020/21. The significant decline is largely due to the COVID-19 related restrictions on alcohol and the implementation of curfews. Road user fatalities declined from 13 fatalities in 2018/19 to 7 fatalities in 2020/21. The incidence of DUI's is lower than the District which had an incidence rate of 110 per 100 000 people in 2020/21.

Residential Burglaries

The unlawful entry of a residential structure with the intent to commit a crime, usually a theft.

The 2020/21 crime statistics released by SAPS and Stats SA indicate that the number of residential burglaries increased by 6.3 per cent in South Africa from 2019/20. Residential burglary cases within the Bitou area however decreased by 5.6 per cent from 544 in 2018/19 to 513 in 2020. When considering the rate per 100 000 population i.e., 741 cases per 100 000 in 2020/21, Bitou's rate is above the District rate of 635 cases per 100 000 people in the same reporting year.

Economy and Labour Market Performance

Sectoral Overview

In 2019, the economy of Bitou was valued at R3.373 billion (current prices) and employed 19 866 people. Historical trends between 2015 and 2019 indicate that the municipal area realised an average annual growth rate of 0.7 per cent, which can mostly be attributed to the tertiary sector that registered a positive annual growth rate of 1.2 per cent.

In terms of sectoral contribution, the finance, insurance, real estate and business services (R849.4 million), wholesale and retail trade, catering and accommodation (R667.0 million) and construction (R414.5 million) sectors were the main drivers that contributed to the positive growth in the Bitou economy. Growth in the economy slowed to -6.4 per cent in 2020, with only the agriculture sector registering positive growth as a result of improved drought conditions and favourable commodity prices.

Net employment in all sectors mirrored the declining GDPR growth rate, with only General Government managing to create jobs (35) in 2020. The largest amount of job losses occurred within the Tertiary sector (-988), followed by the Secondary sector (-387). Despite the positive growth of 13.0 per cent in the Primary sector, it still registered 120 job losses.

Formal and Informal Employment


It is estimated that Bitou's total employed will in 2019 amount to 19 866 workers, of which 14 495 (72.9 per cent) are employed in the formal sector while 5 371 (27.0 per cent) are informally employed. Employment in the formal sector had an annual average decline of 0.2 per cent from 2016 to 2020 while the informal sector suffered an annual average decline of 1.9 per cent over this period.

Most of the formally employed consisted of semi-skilled (44 per cent) and low-skilled (34.3 per cent) workers. The skilled category only contributed 21.7 per cent to total formal employment and was notably outpaced by the other two categories in terms of average annual growth between 2016 and 2020. Low skilled employment declined by 0.7 per cent, while jobs requiring semi-skilled workers declined by 0.6 per cent. The growth in the skilled category (1.2 per cent) reflects the market demand for more skilled labour, especially with the growing tertiary sector in the Bitou municipal area.

Unemployment

Bitou (24.2 per cent) has the highest unemployment rate in the Garden Route District and is even higher than the District (15.4 per cent) and Western Cape (18.9 per cent) unemployment rates. Unemployment has been volatile from 2010-2020. After slowly rising from 22.7 per cent in 2018 to 24.5 per cent in 2019, it declined slightly to 24.2 per cent in 2020. This was largely due to an increase in the discouraged work seekers and not economically active population. This was due to the sluggish economy and negative growth in most sectors. Unfortunately, most job losses affected low and semi-skilled workers who are more vulnerable to living in poverty during times of economic decline.

Public Infrastructure Spend

Spending on Social Infrastructure

Spending on social infrastructure aids in social development and has the spill-over effect of enabling economic growth. The Western Cape Government (WCG) allocated 25.5 per cent of its infrastructure budget on social infrastructure within the Bitou municipal area. 25.3 per cent (R33.210 million) will be spent on Human Settlements which will assist in reducing the current housing backlog and 0.2 per cent will be spent on health infrastructure within Bitou (R300 000). The Municipality will be allocating 4 per cent (R3.283 million) of the budget towards social infrastructure. Sports and recreation (R 1.935 million) and Social Development (R770 000) have been prioritized in the budget, with a further R4.00 million spent on public safety, all serving to improve the quality of life of individuals within the municipal area.

Spending on Economic Infrastructure

Economic infrastructure is defined as infrastructure that promotes economic activity. Considering the economic contraction in 2021, spending on economic infrastructure is crucial to economic recovery.

The WCG allocated R98.0 million (74.5 per cent) towards economic infrastructure, more specifically towards Transport and Public Works. Transport and public works infrastructure go a long way towards unlocking the region's economic potential, especially with Bitou's position on the N2 route, making it a thriving tourist destination. The Municipality assists by contributing a further R30.382 million (i.e. 33.6 per cent of total municipal infrastructure spending) towards road transport.

Spending on Trading Services

Basic services are crucial to improving the living conditions of citizens within the municipal area and enabling economic activity for businesses via access to water, electricity, sanitation and refuse removal. The majority of the Municipality's infrastructure budget i.e., 62.8 per cent or R57.089 million is allocated towards the provision of basic services. Most of the spending on trading services have been allocated towards waste- water management (R19.250 million) in light of recent droughts and an infrastructure maintenance backlog. This was followed by water (R17.639 million), electricity (R9.282 million) and waste- management (R1.600 million). This should assist with expanding the bulk infrastructure network to service the proposed new housing developments.
